The Bells of the North is a women's Cotswold Morris Dance team based in Minneapolis. They were founded in 1979, making them the second oldest team in Minnesota. In addition to dancing, Morris traditions from villages in the Cotswolds of England, they also dance their very own tradition, Minneapolison-Mississippi.

They celebrate the onset of spring and dance up the sun on May 1. From mid-April through early September, catch them dancing outdoors around the Twin Cities on a Wednesday evening, on occasion at the Minnesota Renaissance Festival with Minnesota Traditional Morris, and also at the mighty fine local pub, Merlins Rest.

Twin Cities Welsh welcome winter and the holidays

On Sat., Dec. 8, members and friends of the St. David's Society of Minnesota gathered at University Lutheran Church of Hope for the annual Holiday Tea.

Being a Welsh event, there were music, poetry, and stories, of course, as well as Welsh cakes, dragon cookies, and bara brith [speckled bread] with tea and coffee.

The entire group sang some familiar songs and was introduced to the annual unfamiliar Welsh carol by resident musicologist: David Evan Thomas. "Ewyllys Da [Good Will]" was written by W.S. Gwynn Williams, who was one of the founders of the International Eisteddfod at Llangollen, Wales, in 1947, and became its first musical director.

The St. David's Chorus sang a challenging round: "Canwn Lan [Sing High]" by David Evan Thomas. The Welsh national instrument was not overlooked: member Esmé Evans played the harp during the social time after the program.

The group was introduced to several new poets: President Janice Barbee read "Star of Bethlehem," by Alun Llywelyn-Williams; David Evan Thomas brought laughs as he read "The Nativity Play," by Gwyn Thomas; and Bob Minish read two poems by Denise Levertov.

Vice-president Ilene Alexander closed the program urging members to share memories of holidays in their childhood homes, building on words drawn from the late Martha Davies's translation work.

Well-Read Dragons read Dylan Thomas and Aberfan next

The next meeting of the Well-Read Dragons will be **Sat., Feb. 9**, 11:30 a.m. at Davanni's, south of Cub, on Lexington, just south of Hwy 694. The date was postponed a week so those who wished could attend the memorial service of Society member and Dylan Thomas specialist, William Kimes.

Discussion will focus on the book that came closest to the screen plays Dylan Thomas wanted to write: *Rebecca's Daughters*. It's a rollicking, yet thoughtful, presentation of the historic Rebecca Riots in South Wales.

In the mid-19th century, wealthy landowners built toll gates at close intervals on roads poor people had to use to get what little crop they had to market and to buy what little they could afford to buy. There was no reason for this, other than greed.

So men dressed as women burned the tollbooths, without their identity being discovered. It was a long battle, but by the end of the book the government has appointed a Royal Commission to look into the injustices of the Tollgate System. And lovers are united, and there's hope for the future! What more can a reader ask?

On **April 6**, the group will discuss *Aberfan* by Gaynor Madgwick, Y Lolfa, 2016. Marveen Minish, book club member who nominated this book, said, "I thought I was knowledgeable about the Aberfan tragedy when a coal tip slid down and covered a school, killing most of the children therein. Madgewck was a childhood survivor of the disaster. Reading her book showed me how little I did know."

Opera Blodwen coming to Billings in May

Blodwen was composed by Dr. Joseph Parry and Richard Davies in 1878. Following the pattern of romantic-Italian opera, this story takes place in 14th century Wales and includes a wedding, lovers, dving heroes and a dramatic final twist.

It was the first opera written in the Welsh language, and will be sung in Welsh at the upcoming Billings production.

The opera's stirring music shows Parry at his dramatic best: heroic and romantic solos, exciting ensembles, powerful choruses and, of course, the famous 'Hywel a Blodwen' love duet.

Local music lovers who attended the recital of Welsh singer Jeremy Huw Williams at the University of Minnesota last year, will be interested to know that he will be singing the lead baritone role in Billings! His accompanist, Paula Fan, will be part of the production as well.

In Memoriam

Carolyn Anderson

Carolyn M. (Rees) Anderson, 86, a long-time member of our Society, died peacefully in an Edina Care Facility December 13, 2018.

Carolyn was proud of her Welsh heritage, was a regular attendee at our gatherings and lent her strong alto singing voice to society Gymanfa sings for many decades. One of the great highlights of Carolyn's life was a trip that she took to Wales with her daughter Krissy shortly after her retirement.

She was a long-time building manager in downtown Minneapolis, where she welcomed students from all over the world in the 1960s–1980s.

Carolyn had a beautiful trained contralto voice that she kept in practice well into her retirement years. She sang in Westminster's Choir before her marriage to Harold. After her marriage, since Harold was reared in the Catholic tradition, she found her way to Holy Childhood Catholic Church in St. Paul's Midway area, where she sang under the direction of master Choir Director/Organist Bruce Larson. After Harold's death, she returned to her Presbyterian roots, where she immersed herself in the music of Trinity Grace Presbyterian Church in the uptown area for many more musical years.

She was every choir director's dream—not only responsible and reliable—but a sightreader with perfect pitch who could switch between alto and tenor according to the choir's need for balancing parts. Carolyn continued to find her way to the choir loft at Trinity Grace to sing each Sunday after she was no longer able to "process" or "recess" with the rest of the group.

Carolyn had beautiful qualities of friendship. She was truly interested in people and had many opportunities to hear the stories of interesting people, many of whom had emigrated from countries in conflict—initially as a manager of rental properties in downtown Minneapolis; later with her neighbors in two different Minneapolis senior facilities. Many of her tenants had need for moral support from time to time and Carolyn was there for them, willingly providing such help.

Carolyn was one of those wonderful souls who had a way of contributing to the creation of community wherever she lived—and was always a presence for social justice in a world that is too often rampant with racism. She believed in the message of love of the world's great religions and committed herself to living her faith.

She was preceded in death by her husband Harold Anderson. She is survived by her daughters, Laura (Austin) Ushie, Kris Anderson, three grandchildren, and many who called her mama and grandma.

Dr. William H. Kimes, 82, Professor Emeritus, died on Christmas Day after a yearlong illness.

He taught Theatre Arts and Communications at Hamline University for 38 years; performed many roles at Park Square Theatre in St. Paul, and Square Theatre in St. Paul, and summer stock at the Court Theatre in Beloit, Wis.

Chicago-born, he was a man of wit and wisdom, an admired educator and actor and a lifelong Cubs fan.

In the St. David's Society, he will be remembered for his delightful performances of Dylan Thomas favorites: "Child's Christmas in Wales" and "Under Milk Wood."

He is survived by his wife, Janice; their daughters, Leslie (Kevin Moore) and Alison (Joshua Chen); and four grandchildren. He is also survived by a brother and two sisters-in-law.

Bill and Jan celebrated their 60^{th} anniversary in June.

Janet Campbell (Thomas) Lund, 89, of Minneapolis, died Jan. 13, 2019.

She was preceded in death by sisters Audrey (Ruikka) and Jean (Icenogle), and brother Keith "Bud." She is survived by husband Dean; daughters Julie Lund (Carlos Madrid), Margaret Lund (Chris Steller), and Erika Lund; five; and three nieces.

Janet was born in Minneapolis on June 10, 1929. She grew up in South and SE Minneapolis, attending Marcy School; Marshall High School, where she was a cheerleader, an outstanding student and babysat for the Humphreys in her free time; Hamline University; and what's now the U of M Humphrey School.

She went to England with SPAN (Student Project for Amity among Nations), worked in Naples for NATO and in D.C., moved with Dean to Alaska to help with statehood, then back to Minneapolis to stay—except for two years with their young family in Tanzania.

Janet was active in the DFL and women's and antiwar movements, leading to a career at the State Capitol, where she ran the Legislative Coordinating Commission for many years. In 2004, after retiring, she was a delegate to the 2004 DNC.

Janet kept connected to the world by traveling, studying Italian and Swahili, and hosting students from Costa Rica, India, Spain, the Czech Republic and Vietnam. She made quilts for babies in Glendale, collected "good gossip" for a neighborhood newspaper column, and read books constantly. She was a great maker of friends, on her own and through groups like Somali Women in MN (SWIM), St. David's Society of Minnesota, and Prospect Park Women's Study Club. Famous for her Soup & Bread parties, Janet loved to host family and friends at home on Orlin Ave. SE: at the cabin she and Dean built on Tank Lake on the Iron Range; and at Walker Place, where they made a new home in 2018.
