

Defunct mining community was named for Swansea, Wales

Although a silverlead ore deposit was discovered in 1886, it proved limited in production. Some ore was shipped to Swansea, Wales, for refinement. However, high transportation costs hindered development of the site until the arrival of the railroad.

It's in our genes

Invading Romans, Anglo-Saxons and Normans may have shaped the history, culture and language of the British Isles, but they left surprisingly few genetic traces behind.

DNA samples from more than 2,000 people from rural parts of the United Kingdom reveal 17 subtly different groups that reflect the history of the islands, researchers report in the March 19 Nature.

Among the surprises: Traditionally Celtic-speaking groups in Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Cornwall, on the southwest tip of England, are genetically distinct from each other. Researchers had previously assumed that Celts were a uniform group that spread throughout the islands.

Welsh people appear to be descendants of the first British settlers after the Ice Age, the analysis found. The Welsh remained genetically isolated from the rest of Britain, the researchers found no trace of Anglo-Saxon heritage in their DNA.

The study also reveals that after Roman rule, invading Anglo-Saxons didn't wipe out and replace the Britons. Instead, they mixed and intermarried with them.

On Sat., April 30, 7:30 p.m., at St. Mary's Chapel, St. Paul Seminary, 2260 Summit Ave., St. Paul, Paul Mealor's newly orchestrated "Stabat Mater"—scored for choir, soprano solo and string orchestra—will be performed for the first time in the greater U.S., after once in New York.

Paul Mealor, from St. Asaph, North Wales, is described in the New York Times as "one of the most important composers to have emerged in Welsh choral music since William Matthias... a real and original talent...music of deep spiritual searching that always asks questions, offers answers and fills the listener with hope."

Hello friends,

Out of the blue recently we had a phone call from a man in Dawn, Mo., inquiring about translating an old Welsh book.

Some years ago his uncle had bought an old home in rural Dawn. Before demolishing the home, he went through the attic sand found an old record book which he saved for many years.

A few people in the community recognized the writing as Welsh and found the names of some old family members.

The old book was passed down to James, the man who phoned us. Now that he is retired, he has time to investigate the old Welsh book. He checked with the library in Chilacothe, Mo., and they referred him to the Welsh of Kansas City who referred him to us.

James did a little translation online and figured out that the first page was headed Congregational Church, but later in the book there are other records including several accounts about a land dispute.

James will send us copies of some of the pages so we can tell him more. We know that the Welsh Baptists were strong in Dawn, Mo. I'll check my file of Y Drych articles from Dawn and see if a Congregational Church is mentioned.

LET'S ALL keep our eyes open for other Welsh record books and letters and REMAIN A STRONG NETWORK OF WELSH-AMERICAN SOCIETIES so the word gets around whenever old Welsh books and artifacts are discovered.
