News of the Well-Read Dragons

The Rape of the Fair Country by Alexander Cordell.

The town of Blaenavon located in a once booming industrial valley in southeastern Wales boasts a



museum devoted to Alexander Cordell, author of *The Rape of the Fair Country*. There Cordell set that novel and the two others in the "Mortymer Trilogy," which recounts a Welsh family living through the tumultuous second quarter of the 19th century in Wales. Cordell never surpassed the title of the first novel of the trilogy, nor the drama of its story.

The website of BBC. Wales includes a tour guide's remarks on *The Rape of the Fair Country* as she walks the streets of Blaenavon. The novel is "incredibly important," she insists, because it "paints a fairly accurate picture of the way things really were in industrial [south Wales] ... the desperation in which people lived ... the love that shown through, despite all the dirt, noise, and injury. I find it incredibly moving and you can imagine the novel as you walk these old streets."

Iestyn Mortimer narrates the story, but the novel belongs to his older sister Morfydd, who defies their conservative father. That defiance is but rehearsal for a larger role. She renounces the forces of exploitation and cruelty that abound in a society torn by protest against the unfairly distributed wealth of industrial growth. In this crucible of change and pain, the Welsh must rediscover themselves as a people and frame their future.

Cordell may have been an unlikely chronicler of Wales, coming from a British colonial background (he was born in Ceylon in 1914) and a career in the military. He found his real calling only in the 1950s when the memory of his mother from the Rhondda Valley called him back to Wales. *The Rape of the Fair Country* leaves no one who reads it unchanged. It has haunted this writer for five decades.

She is a senior lecturer at Hywel Teifi Academy, Swansea University, and lives in Cardiff.
