News of the August meeting of the Well-Read Dragons

Member Berwyn Jones from Lincoln, Neb., is not a member of the Well-Read Dragons. But this review in the Welsh newspaper Ninnau & Y Drych encouraged us to choose the title for August 2012 reading.



A Man's Estate, by Emyr

Humphreys, 1955; Parthian Library of Wales edition, paperback, \$16.95 US, 2007.

This novel was my introduction to both the author and to the Library of Wales, a reprint series that republishes quality English-language works by Welsh authors that have fallen out of print. If this book is representative of the series, I want them all! Emyr Humphreys is a graduate of the University of Wales, Aberystwyth, who writes in both English and Welsh. He has written more than 20 novels in his long, productive career.

A Man's Estate describes a decaying class-ridden society in a north Wales village, post World War II. It does so in some of the most awesomely handsome English I have enjoyed in many a year.

The plot revolves around Philip, a young Welsh-born medical researcher raised by an "aunt" in England, who is urged to seek his roots by a snobbish English potential father-in-law. His arrival in his natal village in Wales profoundly affects each of the characters in a different way.

The narrative is related in turn by young Philip; his (unknown to him) sister Hannah; their twice-married mother and her second husband; Idris, the ineffectual minister of a decaying Welsh chapel; Ada, an ambitious young villager who is the illegitimate half-sister of Philip and Hannah. In short, as star-crossed a family group as could be imagined—partly mid-20th century modern, partly almost feudal in its obsession with class. And it is yet another cautionary tale of the corrosiveness of dark family secrets.

The story is told in some of the most beautiful English prose I have ever had the pleasure of encountering. In places, it wants rereading over and over to taste the sheer poetry of it. You can in places hear the echo of the author's Welsh first language, as it rolls about the mind's ear. The book's ending is poignant for each of the characters, each in a different way, several of them almost dismissively.

The Library of Wales is another excellent project of the Welsh Assembly Government. I can't help thinking that its output of 29 volumes (to date) would make an excellent basis for a Reader's Club of an American Welsh Society. I also hereby resolve to use the internet to find and devour more of Emyr Humphreys' novels.

If you are interested in coming to the Well Read Dragons, you're welcome even if you haven't been able to read the book.

Oct. 6 — Darkness Visible: A Novel of the 1892 Homestead Strike by Trilby Busch.

Member and historian Trilby Busch will be with us. The book recreates a defining moment in American labor history. Workers from the Homestead (Pittsburgh area) Works, Carnegie Steel Company, striking for reasonable living wages, were violently attacked by Pinkerton "guards" hired by the company, turning what had been a peaceful strike into a horrific bloodbath and changing the lives of Homestead's families forever. Many of the strikers were immigrants, among whom were large numbers of Welsh, Germans, and eastern Europeans.

Dec. 1 — *Resistance* by Owen Sheers. After all the women in a remote Welsh town awaken to find their husbands gone, German occupiers arrive in this alternate-reality thriller set in 1944. Facing a harsh winter, the women and soldiers find they must cooperate with one another to survive. This title has been made into a film in Britain. One of our members is getting the DVD so we can watch that at another time, singly or in groups.

Feb. 2, 2013 — Stanley: The impossible life of Africa's Greatest Explorer by Tim Jeal.

Seven copies in the Hennepin County Library System and also available in the St. Paul and Ramsey County Libraries. The Welsh connection? Read it to find out. The American connection? Ditto!

One member has already read this and promises that surprises of every sort await readers in the group! It will be an interesting discussion, no doubt. Why not come for that one, even if you can't attend the others?

April 6 — *Dragon and Crescent* by Grahame Davies. This book "opens up a whole new field of study, revealing the huge Muslim influence on Wales, and the equally momentous Welsh influence on Islamic lands." Unfortunately, it's not on www.mnlink.org yet [meaning not in a Minnesota library]. Abebooks & Amazon sell used copies. However, one of the group's members will be in the U.K. in January. She's willing to pick up some used copies there to avoid shipping cost.

June 1 — Any of the new versions Mabinogion stories from Seren Press [in Wales].

Titles are: *White Ravens* by Owen Sheers; *The Ninth Wave* by Russell Celyn Jones;

The Meat Tree by Gwyneth Lewis; **The Dreams of Max & Ronnie** by Niall Griffiths;

The White Trail by Fflur Dafydd; and *The Prince's Pen* by Horatio Clare.

Get a good introduction to the tales from the youth volume, *Tales from the Mabinogion* by Gwyn Thomas and Kevin Crossley-Holland. It's available in St. Paul & Minneapolis Libraries.

Aug. 3 — Rape of the Fair Country by Alexander Cordell.

One reviewer writes: "Cordell brings the Welsh character to life with three-dimensional people enduring the bitter hardships of $19^{\mbox{th}}$ century mining life. Humorous, tragic, heartfelt, real."

Oct. 5 — History of the Welsh Church in Jackson, Ohio: Travel, Fishing and Farewells by Evan O. Roberts, translated by Martha Davies [member of our Society].

The church history section is interesting and the settlers' stories are poignant and informative. The second half of the book is a collection of witty essays by E. O. Roberts, a coal miner who worked his way up in life and eventually owned four mines. Available at www.welshheritage.org.



2012 Festival — Scranton, Pa.

About 700 Welsh people (most from North America, but about 100 from Wales) gathered at the Hotel Hilton in Scranton, Pa., for the $81^{\rm st}$ Welsh National Gymanfa Ganu at the North American Festival of Wales.

Seminars on Welsh topics

Seminars focusing on the Welsh in Pennsylvania, including the Avondale Mine Disaster of 1869, were popular, as were three seminars on Welsh genealogy. The Ysgol Gân [Singing School] taught by the Gymanfa director at which attendees learn pronunciation and notes for Sunday's hymns was popular, as always. This year Welsh folk dancing was in a wide hall. This gave many more people a chance to watch. Always popular are Welsh language classes and advice for investors.

Eisteddfod

Competitors of all ages presenting songs or recitations, with Welsh judges adjudicating. Winners received cash prize and participated in the winners concert. Winner of the David G. Morris Memorial Award for a semi-professional singer was won by Elizabeth Shoemaker. She won a trip to Wales to the value of \$3,500 in order to compete in the National Eisteddfod of Wales.

At the Eisteddfod concert, the winner of last year's David G. Morris competition, Catrin Williams, also sang. In Wales in August, She had the good fortune of winning the mezzo soprano competition.

Marketplace

Welsh lovespoons to pins, caps and teapots of every possible description were available at the busy Marketplace. One of our members, Trilby Busch, was there selling her new book, *Darkness Visible*.

Concerts:

Dafydd Iwan, opened the Festival, with songs many in the audience remembered. He was celebrating his 50^{th} anniversary as a singer. He has been at the forefront of the Welsh music and political scene since the heady days of the '60s, which saw the resurgence of the Welsh language and Welsh culture generally.

The featured choir for the event was **Côr Godre'r Garth** from the Pontypridd area of Wales. The group, ably directed by **Eilir Owen Griffiths**, has won first prize at the National Eisteddfod in Wales five of the last six years in the competition for choirs with more than 45 voices.

After a Saturday evening concert, the group also sang at each gymanfa singing session on Sunday.

Gymanfa Ganu sessions:

Gareth Hughes Jones, administrator of the William Matthiaas College of Music in Caernarfon, directed both gymanfa sessions. His direction could hardly have been more energetic and precise.

Gareth has been a core staff member at Welsh Heritage Week nearly every year since 1989.

Accompanist for those singing session, and for the Eisteddfod, was **David Enlow**, organst at the Church of the Resurrection in New York City. He is also music director of the Welsh Congregational Church of New York.

IN MEMORIAM: Russell Griffin

Russell E. Griffin, 86, of St. Paul, died August 30, 2012. He was born in Battle Creek, Mich. After high school he entered Duke University under the Navy's V-12 program, earning a naval commission and two bachelor's degrees. His active duty was served in the amphibians putting "the Pacific fight to bed."

Then, at the University of Michigan, he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering, as well as his education credentials. This was followed by two years at Chicago Theological Seminary. During that time, he also met his future wife, Enid Larson.

Russell and Enid were married in 1952. They stayed on at the seminary for several years. He taught high school science and math in northern Illinois for a year, then served a small church near Battle Creek, followed by work as an engineer.

In 1959, they moved to St. Paul, where Enid was raised, eventually living in the home her parents built in 1928.

He worked for 32 years with the U.S. Dept. of Interior, Bureau of Mines, at Fort Snelling.

Besides his wife, Russell is survived by their children: Fran (Dan) Beverness of Fairmont, Minn.; Bonnie (Rick) Shoebottom of St. Paul; Alvin (Nancy) of Maryland; Glenn (Cheryl) and Lu (Mike Hesano) of St. Paul; Olaf (Paula) of Roseville; Ben (Stephanie Hughes) of San Jose; and Millie (Brian) Webb of Madison, Wis.

His funeral service will be held at First Christian Church of Minnesota, 610 W. 28th St., Minneapolis, 55408, on Saturday, September 22 at 3 p.m.
