Under Milk Wood to be presented March 4

There will be one performance only of Under Milk Wood on Friday, March 4, 2011, at 7:30 p.m. at the Ramada Plaza Hotel, 1330 Industrial Blvd. at 35W, in Minneapolis. The play is directed by William Kimes and features a cast of both Society members and actors from the community. Under Milk Wood is presented as part of the 100th Anniversary Celebration of the founding of the St. David's Society of Minnesota.

Under Milk Wood—A Play for Voices, was written and performed in 1953 just months before the author's death at age 39. Intended to be done on radio or as a platform dramatic reading, it is a touching, funny and boisterous account of one day from dawn to nightfall in a fantastical Welsh village peopled by eccentrics with endearing traits and curious behavior.

Enjoy history and hospitality at Glenwood's Ann Bickle Heritage House

Who was Ann Bickle? By Wendy Worner

Wendy, from Stillwater, attended the special tea in the special home in Glenwood on Nov. 6, thus missing the Nov. 13 storm that kept two cars of hopeful attendees home.

Ann Jones Bickle was born in Aberystwyth, Wales, in 1886. As a young girl studied voice and once sang for King Edward VII and Queen Alexandria, when they were Prince and Princess of Wales. She sang with the Brenig Choir, which won first place in the Llandudno International Eisteddfod in 1886.

She emigrated when she was 18 and initially settled in Canada. She later moved to Minneapolis to study music.. She helped form the St. David's Society, and it was there that Frank Bickle came to search for a bride. He wanted someone with a similar background to his, as he was from England. At the age of 50, in 1935, Ann married Frank and moved to Glenwood. He was a Soo Line engineer.

Ann could have lived a very comfortable, privileged life, but became the ultimate volunteer. She started the local hospital auxiliary, and soon after, in 1946, almost single-handedly started the Minnesota

Hospital Auxiliary, and was its first president. Ann traveled around Minnesota and Canada helping other communities start their auxiliaries. During World War II, she was the chairman of the Citizen's Service Corps of Pope County. She received four citations for her work which represented 2,000 hours of volunteer work.

Ann died in 1984 at the age of 98. The house was to be auctioned off in 1988, but a group of local women intervened and were able to save the home and get it listed on the National Historic Register. The house was purchased by a nonprofit organization and had all of its original furniture and antiques included.

The house was built in 1913, and at the time, was one of the finest in town. It displays turn-of-the century Craftsman styling, with two fireplaces, leaded glass windows and more.

One of the treasures in the home is a collection of Gaudy Welsh pottery, including the bowl used to hold water for Ann's baptism. The Gaudy Welsh was indicated in Ann's will as belonging to "The Minnesota Welsh Society." When the St. David's Society was contacted in the late 1980s, it was

arranged for all of those pieces to remain in the Society's ownership, as Ann had requested, but to be kept on permanent loan to the Ann Bickle Heritage House.

Reclaiming the "Tea Party"


Ann Jones Bickle was born in Wales in 1886. Later, she settled and lived in Glenwood and contributed in many ways to that community and the state of Minnesota. After her death, an enterprising group of women bought her home and its contents when it was scheduled for public auction. To help maintain the home, an annual Christmas Tea fundraiser is held every November for a series of three Saturdays.

"Wales" was the theme for this year's tea and the committee researched to find authentic decorations and food for the occasion.

At the entrance was a Mari Llwyd (horseskull with streamers) and plowshares. There was also greenery with dried fruit, holly, and berries throughout the house. Calennigs, apples supported on twigs studded with cloves, were the table center pieces. Red dragons decorated one of the Christmas trees. There was live background music and after a short presentation, everyone present was invited to sing two carols; one being, "The Holly and the Ivy."

The food was delicious—poached pear, scones with jam and cream or lemon curd, finger sandwiches, cake, and of course, never ending refills of tea. We were all allowed to choose a fancy hat to dress for the tea.

Time was given to look around the beautiful home , so well preserved. Anne Bickle's trunk which she brought with her to Ellis Island was there, along with photos, paintings, her china and rugs. The Gaudy Welsh china on permanent loan from our

society was prominently displayed. A prayer in Welsh hangs above her bed.

She used to hold community poetry readings and sing-a-longs in her home and some of her sheet music (with the title and words in Welsh) were on the piano along with a traditional Welsh hat. Sharon Larson and the women who cooked and served the food were warm and welcoming. One of the ladies had Pugh and Hughes relatives.

They were thrilled to have members from the St. David's Society in attendance. We were thrilled to be there. We really enjoyed ourselves and it was a great start to the 2010 Christmas season.

Wouldn't it be fun to see the Ann Bickle Heritage House for yourself?

It's Lord Dafydd Wigley now!

Dafydd Wigley, former Plaid Cymru leader and longtime MP for Wales, received a peerage from Queen Elizabeth in the House of Lords. He will sit as a crossbencher, because the political party needs four to five members to be considered a viable group. Presently only one other Plaid Cymru peer, Lord Ellis-Thomas, sits in the House.

Wigley, 67, plans to use his seat in the Lords "to speak up for the people of Wales." He added, "I will also continue to press the case of reform of the second chamber and look forward to the day when its members are democratically elected."

Now the honorary president of Plaid Cymru, Wigley served as an MP between 1974 and 2001 and was an assembly member in its first term from 1999.

[Ed. note: Members of the St. David's Society of Minnesota can be extra proud of the fact that Wigley spoke at our 2010 centenary banquet last March.]

At last! Can you believe it? Welsh is finally the official language in Wales!

The Welsh language became the official language of Wales, following a historic vote at the National Assembly in Cardiff on Dec. 7, 2010.

Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2010, is the longest and most complex piece of legislation the government has ever voted on. It was passed unanimously and included a clause confirming the official status of the Welsh language. It is the most important law passed in this are since the Welsh Language Act of 1993,

While the new legislation encourages the use of Welsh in daily life, it primarily impacts larger companies that provide public services, such as utility and telephone companies, who will be required to use the Welsh language in a "reasonable and proportionate way,"

Just before the final vote, Plaid Cymru AM Bethan Jenkins put forward an amendment that would have strengthened the measure. It read: "Everyone has the right to use the Welsh language in Wales as far as that is reasonable and proportionate in the circumstances." Her motion was rejected.

Cymdeithas yr Iaith Gymraeg [the Welsh Language Society] noted that the Jenkins amendment would have made a noticeable impact in people's lives.

A request from lowa

I am writing in regard to the diaries of Joshua Williams who lived in Lime Springs, Iowa; a Welsh community in northern Iowa. These diaries go back to the time of 1896 when he was approximately 18 years old. Part of his diaries include a good bit about the history of his family, however a major share is about daily happenings in history, both locally and nationally.

These diaries are held in the Iowa State Historical Library in Iowa City. They have offered to provide them to us if we should wish to microfilm them. The "us" is the Howard-Winneshiek Genealogy Society located in Cresco, Iowa, which has a microfilm reader/ printer to make them accessible to the general public in the area where he grew up.

In some of the material that I have read about the Welsh in Minnesota it said "So far as the Welsh population is contributing to the prosperity of the city, Minneapolis is indebted to a great extent to Lime Springs, Iowa, and vicinity." Then it goes on to tell about the people who went to Minneapolis from Lime Springs, Iowa.

The funding for this project is more than our society is able to provide and so we are looking for others who may consider this a valuable piece of history that needs to be preserved.

Would the St. David's Society of Minnesota, or individual members of it, consider it a worthwhile cause? The microfilming is going cost over \$10,000.00. We would be happy to give you more information about this gentleman if there is some interest in this project.

This was brought to our attention by one of your members and she felt that it would be a valuable genealogical tool as well as historical.




