

Possible Interview Questions:

Questions about you and/or your Welsh ancestors

- 1. Where in Wales did your family emigrate from and why?
- 2. Where did they immigrate to initially?
- 3. What do you know about the places from which they immigrated?
- 4. What places in Wales are special to you?
- 5. What Welsh traditions, connections, words, stories, etc. were part of your growing up?
- 6. What is important to you about being of Welsh heritage and/or having a connection to Wales?

Questions about your membership in the Society

- 1. How long have you been a member? Why did you join?
- 2. Have you taken on any roles in the Society or in other Welsh organizations and/or received any honors? If yes, please explain.
- 3. What stands out as a great memory or highlight from the years you have been a member?
- 4. As part of continuing to learn about Wales, what resources do you seek out? Which two or three would you recommend to other members? Include books, music, films, performers, websites, news sources, etc.
- 5. What opportunities do you see for the future of the Society?

'MONUMENTAL EFFORT' NEEDED ACROSS CARDIFF TO HIT AMBITIOUS CARBON NEUTRAL TARGET

A monumental effort across the city is needed to get Cardiff to carbon neutral by 2030, council bosses have said. A major push to change public behaviour will take place over the next few years to get people in Cardiff to play their part in cutting carbon emissions. Driving less, eating less meat, and heating homes differently are all seen as critical in hitting the city's ambitious targets to tackle climate change...

The goal is to reduce the city's carbon emissions—currently more than 1.6 million tonnes a year—to net zero. Much of that reduction is planned to come from changing how people travel around the city...

According to the Centre for Climate Change and Social Transformation, the top actions individuals can take to reduce their carbon footprint are: living car-free; shifting to electric vehicles or public transport; flying less often; using renewable energy; retrofitting homes with better insulation and replacing gas boilers with heat pumps; and

eating less meat...


The climate action plan has several key objectives: reduce energy use, make buildings more energy-efficient, increase the supply of renewable energy, cut carbon emissions from supply chains, waste less and recycle more, plant trees to absorb carbon dioxide, make the city more resilient to cope with heatwaves and floods, and grow more food locally.

WALES LAUNCHES DRIVE TO KEEP YOUNG PEOPLE IN THEIR HOMELAND

The Welsh government is launching a drive to persuade more young people to remain in their homeland amid growing concerns that the percentage of working-age citizens is dropping to worryingly low levels....On Monday the economy minister, Vaughan Gething, will set out a vision of the country's economic future, with finding ways of retaining and bringing in talent at the centre of it...


Gethings said in an interview prior to the launch: "It's a really significant challenge for us. If we don't have more people of working age in good work, we'll end up with a smaller and smaller

tax base...We need to persuade more people to stay in Wales, more people to come back to Wales and more people to make Wales part of their story. We want to make best use of the talent we have as well as attracting people to Wales. People move to Wales to retire but it's a great place to work as well.... It's about having a more optimistic vision about the future – you don't have to get out to get on, there's a really good environment for you in Wales, not just for business or work but a good place to live."

...The government is also concerned about the future of the Welsh language if more young people leave. The Welsh government set a goal of a million Welsh speakers by 2050, but to achieve this, young people will need to find good quality jobs in Wales... They are making the case that "Wales is a more inclusive, open and green nation to live in where workers are treated with respect."

SPEAKING OF WALES...

Halloween in Wales

Great Britain has adopted many American Halloween customs: decorating homes, dressing in costumes, carving pumpkins and attending events that scare you. This year in Wales, you can ride in a "cursed coaster" in Zip World's Ffear Fforest or the ghost train on Talyllyn Railway, pick pumpkins, be chased by zombies, or go on a ghost hunt in Gwydir Castle. The Welsh also remember the ways this time of year was celebrated in times past that contain the roots of the ways we celebrate today. November 1 is called Calan Gaeaf in Wales (the first day of winter) and Oct. 31 is Nos Calan Gaeaf. The ancient Celts divided the year into two halves, and this was the beginning of the dark half of the year. In pre-Christian times it was celebrated as a time when the veil between this world and the "otherworld" known as "Annwn" was the thinnest, and spirits were thought to walk the earth. Bonfires were built for the villagers to gather around. Children were frightened with stories of Y Hwch Ddu Gwta, the tailless black sow, and a headless woman called Y Ladi Wen, the White Lady, who some said guarded graveyards and crossroads from evil spirits and others said lured travelers to their death. Turnips would be carved out and a candle placed in them to scare away unwelcome guests.

It was also a time to celebrate the harvest. Villages would celebrate together with the tradition of the harvest mare. The last sheafs of grain would be fashioned into the shape of a horse and hung above the hearth. But getting it into the house involved much "horseplay" -- the women would try to throw water at it and the men would try to keep it dry as it was brought into the house. Enjoy whatever customs you keep to celebrate this time of year!
