Lessons are based on *Dysgu Cymraeg Cwrs Mynediad* materials. The most recent unit completed is Unit 8.



St. David's Day Program, Part 1 - Lord Dafydd Wigley's Ties to Minnesota

Lord Dafydd Wigley delighted St. David's Day Luncheon guests with the remarkable story of his discovery of Wigley family links with Minnesota, from Mrs. Evan E. (Maimie) Wigley and her son Richard E. "Dick" Wigley (who served as a Minnesota State Representative from 1971 – 1985), to his nephew, Paul, and Paul's wife, Becky, who were able to join us on February 25 via Zoom. Society members living in Blue Earth County and Lake Crystal, Minnesota are no doubt familiar with the emigration of three Wigley brothers, cousins of Lord Wigley's grandfather, from Wales to Minnesota, in 1857 or 1858, with Evan E. Wigley - the grandson of one of the three brothers - and with Richard Wigley's service as Blue Earth County Commissioner (beginning in 1877), and his service as a State Senator from 1885-1887. Though the Wigleys of Minnesota were predominantly farmers in the Lake Crystal area, Wigley descendants have also made a name for themselves in the music world: Dick Wigley's son, Paul, is a former choral director at Lakeville High School, an active member of the Minneapolis Commodores, and a leader in the Barbershop music community.

Daughter Sarah Wigley is currently a Clinical Associate Professor of Voice and Musical Theatre Coordinator at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. When she lived in Minneapolis, Ms. Wigley performed professionally at the Guthrie Theatre, the Skylark Opera, the Mystery Cafe, the Minnesota Centennial Showboat, and the Minnesota Opera. Mike Wigley, another descendent of the original Wigley brothers, lives with his family in Plymouth, Minnesota, and Dick Wigley's nephew, Dr. Bruce Jones, is a Professor Emeritus of Automotive Science at Mankato State University, where Earle Wigley was not only inducted into the MSU Hall of Fame, but also taught history and social studies some decades ago. Lord Wigley closed this portion of his presentation with equally fascinating facts about family travel to and from Wales, his industrial exploits on this side of the pond, and two other famous Wigley descendants who will be featured in a future newsletter. For now, I'll note that Lord Wigley's wife, world-renowned harpist Elinor Bennett, traveled to Minnesota with her husband and not only graced all who attended the 2014 NAFOW in Minneapolis with glorious performances, she also played solo concerts in St. Paul and Plymouth, Minnesota.

Guests were then treated to a brief history of Wales, covering developments that put Wales where it finds itself today, followed by a review of national values that forged Wales' political identity and a "State of the Union" of Wales, highlighting its current government and implications of recent political developments that shape the daily lives of the people of Wales today and will continue to shape lives of the Welsh in the future. A summary of these remarks will be the subject of Installment 2, to be shared in our next Issue.

[Editor's Note: Dafydd Wigley served as Plaid Cymru Member of Parliament (MP) for Caernarfon (a royal town, community and port in Gwynedd, Wales) from 1974 until 2001 and as Assembly Member for Caernarfon from 1999 until 2003. He led Plaid Cymru from 1981 to 1984 and again from 1991 to 2000. In 2010 he was granted a life peerage by the late Queen Elizabeth and took his seat in the House of Lords as Baron Wigley of Caernarfon in January 2011.]

A True Tale of Serendipitous Surprises that Ended in a Song

Two years ago my poem, "Who Plays the Harp" was published in this newsletter. How the writing of it came about, and what I learned along the way, is an interesting story-- to me-- and I hope will be, to you.

It started when I saw an ad in the St David's Society newsletter saying, "Harps Wanted in Patagonia." My thought upon reading this was, "Who the heck plays the harp in Patagonia?" It piqued my curiosity, so I decided to find out. Well, of course, I decided to ask Mary Mergenthal, who knows All. And she told me there were a group of Welsh settlers who settled in Patagonia in the 1800's. That made me even more curious, so I went to Wikipedia and found the whole story, complete with the names of the settlers, the ship, and some of their trials when they first arrived.

One of the things that grabbed my attention was that the first town they settled they named "Rawson." Now that is a family name on my mother's side of the family, and I suddenly recalled a memory of my grandmother showing me a letter written by a relative who was travelling in Patagonia. In the letter, he said, "There's a statue in the middle of this town of one of our ancestors, so we must have done

something right." Or words to that effect. So that made me wonder if it could possibly be true, and, if so, how could that come about. And I decided to see if I could find out.

My knowledge of the Rawson branch of the family was that my grandfather's grandmother, "the snooty one," Elizabeth Prudence Rawson, was "snooty" because she was in a line from Edward Rawson who was a Secretary of the Massachusetts Bay Company (1651 to 1658). And there was a book that traced the family all the way back. Well, I won't bore you with the details, but I found a direct line from his brother, Cornelius, to a Rawson in Argentina, Guillermo Rawson, who had become Secretary of the Interior for Argentina. And it turned out that he was the one who granted the Welsh permission to settle on that land. And he was the one they named the town after. (Considering the state of that land, I don't really think they should have been that grateful.)

So there is one part of this story. Now, after I wrote the poem, I sent it to Mary Mergenthal and she said she thought Elinor Bennett, a well-known harpist in Wales, would also like to see it, so she wrote and asked her. Then Elinor wrote back and told her that she was the one who had written the Want Ad for Harps in Patagonia! And that one of her students was now teaching the harp to a student in Patagonia, and they would probably like to see the poem, too. So I sent it to them, and it turned out that the young girl in Patagonia was playing a harp that had been donated as a result of that ad! (And she lives in Rawson.) So I really enjoyed this whole series of unlikely events!

And then, to top it all off, I sent the poem to David Evan Thomas and he composed a delightful song from it. And if you're interested, here is a link so that you can hear the song: https://soundcloud.com/jonny-broom/who-plays-the-

And hopefully, one day, when we all meet in person, someone will sing it then, too.

Exultate Chamber Choir & Orchestra, Gelert is Coming to Minnesota

The beloved legend of the faithful dog Gelert has been told to Welsh children for hundreds of years. Perhaps the traditional folk tale has been handed down in your family. In October 2022 as part of the North Wales International Music Festival, composer Paul Mealor and librettist Grahame Davies presented the world premiere of their new community opera "Gelert," which picks up the story as King Llewelyn the Great looks back upon the tragic day he killed his trustworthy dog, Gelert, in a mistaken fit of rage. For you see, upon returning from the hunt and finding Gelert dripping in blood standing by his son's overturned cradle, he assumed the worst. Only after hearing his baby's cry and finding the dead body of the wolf nearby, did Llewelyn realize the awful mistake that would haunt him for the rest of his life.

Davies' libretto, masterfully written in rhyme in both Welsh and English, was premiered in both languages at Saint Asaph cathedral (*Eglwys Gadeiriol Llanelwy*) in the small city of Saint Asaph, North Wales, in the very church Mealor attended as a boy. After experiencing both performances, Exultate Chamber Choir and Orchestra's artistic director Thomas Rossin pledged to bring "Gelert" to the Twin Cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis, Minnesota. "We are thrilled to announce public performances of 'Gelert' on Friday and **Saturday August 4-5, 2023 in the Twin Cities area** along with amazing opportunities to meet the renowned Welsh creators Mealor and Davies," Rossin said. Plans are underway to make this event one that highlights the strong traditions of story and music so vital to the Welsh heritage and connection to the North American Welsh community.

Auditions to join the GELERT Choir were announced earlier this month so you have an opportunity to be a part of this marvelous experience. The preparation is minimal as the score is not difficult to learn. Your commitment is to attend three rehearsals and 2 (perhaps three) concerts. Interested? Let's Go to Lincoln!

It isn't often that a large event featuring Welsh culture is held within driving distance of Minnesota, but for the first time in its history, the North American Festival of Wales (NAFOW) will be held in Lincoln, Nebraska, over Labor Day weekend. The Minnesota Welsh Association (MWA) has chartered a coach bus

from Minnesota to the headquarters hotel in Lincoln, Nebraska. The bus will depart Minneapolis on **Thursday, August 31**, make a stop in Mankato, and then continue on to Nebraska. We will return to Minnesota on **Monday, September 4**.

What will happen at the festival? This year's event features world-class Welsh entertainment and seminar presentations, a theatre production, vendors, and community singing. We'll also have our own special opportunity to visit the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Centre, the archive for Welsh America in Wymore, Nebraska. The Grand Concert and 91st National Gymanfa Ganu, a hymn-singing festival, will be under the direction of award-winning Welsh composer Robat Arwyn.

The seminar lineup includes presentations on the "History of the Welsh Language in 10 Words;" and "The Black Chair," a retelling of the story of Welsh poet Hedd Wyn, who was killed on the first day of the Battle of Passchendaele during World War I. Nebraska native and former TV talk show host Dick Cavett will Zoom in to the festival and share memories of interviews with Welsh celebrities. Additional seminar topics will focus on language, history, music, genealogy, and politics in Wales today.

The festival will be held at the Lincoln Marriott Cornhusker Hotel, with additional events held at the Nebraska State Capitol building and Saint Paul United Methodist Church. 

Talk by Hywel (Taff) Roberts on *The Legendary King Arthur & His Welsh Connections*November 19, 2022 at St. Anthony Park Lutheran Church

Then, the story of who Arthur was changed dramatically after the Norman conquest of the isles in 1066.
