




The stories of Welsh cemetery residents were brought to life by their spirits. Some of stories were sad and tragic and others were inspiring.

Gifted singers from around the United States and Wales entertained us throughout the NAFOW weekend!

Our **second NAFOW Member Spotlight** comes to us from Society member Danny Proud, who shares four of his favorite NAFOW 2023 memories. Except for the 3rd photo of Triano, taken by Laurie Williams, all photos in this section were graciously shared by Danny.

1. Girls group Triano at the Wednesday Evening Kickoff and Saturday Grand Concert

Triano – triplets Charlotte, Jessica and Emily – joined by 8-year-old Nel Edward-Philips (granddaughter of Dafydd Edwards, who performed in Minneapolis in the 1990s) wowed the crowd at the Welsh Night program held outdoors on the Cornhuskers Hotel patio and 13th Street. They played ukuleles and sang folk songs before the start of the Grand Concert at Saint Paul United Methodist Church and were featured guests in the Grand Concert as well. They sang so effortlessly and confidently – what a delightful group!





2. Many Moccasins Dance Troupe at Wednesday Night Kickoff

Many Moccasins is a professional dance ensemble based in Winnebago, Nebraska. They have performed all over the world, educating audiences with a range of Native American dances. They provided a lively program that revealed aspects of their spirituality and customs.



3. Bus Tour to Arvonia and Emporia, Kansas

A couple dozen NAFOW participants stayed an extra two days to take advantage of an opportunity to visit and learn more about Arvonia and Emporia, Kansas, thanks to tour coordinator Susan Evans Atchison.

Arvonia is a small Welsh settlement that is being restored from its community center and schoolhouse to its chapel. After our Arvonia stop for lunch at the Township Hall and guided tours of the renovated buildings, we rode on to Emporia, the county seat of Lyon County, located halfway between Kansas City and Wichita, in eastern Kansas. Founded in 1857, downtown Emporia is well preserved; elegant century-old buildings are reminiscent of a bustling, prosperous commercial center. We enjoyed a buffet dinner in the town's historical museum downtown and took in two floors of antiques and memorabilia.

We were introduced to the historical figure William Allen White, a Pulitzer Prize-winning newspaper editor and commentator, the "Sage of Emporia," who had a national following but chose to stay in Emporia, working on the Emporia *Gazette*. Our last stop before returning to Lincoln was a tour of the Richard Howe House, built by Welshman Richard Howe, a master stone mason who completed construction on the house after the Civil War ended. The house is well-preserved and furnished as it was lived in for three generations.

I came away from this visit to Arvonia and Emporia with a greater appreciation of the contribution of Welsh immigrants to the area, who numbered in the thousands. They gathered in Welsh-speaking chapels, held *eisteddfodau* and *cymanfoedd*, and were leaders in their communities.

4. Eisteddfod Visual Arts Competition

The NAFOW Eisteddfod consists of various competitions – singing, recitation, poetry and prose, and the visual arts.

This year's Visual Arts Competition theme was "Roots/Gwreiddiau." This is the only Eisteddfod category in which NAFOW attendees vote to determine the winners. In the photo below, I am minding the shop in the Marketplace where the entries are on display.



Our **third NAFOW Member Spotlight** comes from Society Member Donald Barbee who provides a review of two new theater productions, both collaborations between Owen Thomas and Gareth Bale – the team that brought us ... well, you'll find out below! Read on.

"Grav" & "Carwyn" A Review by Donald Barbee

Anyone who has watched "Welcome to Wrexham," a Hulu series about billionaire movie stars who buy and rehabilitate a fallen football (soccer) franchise in Wales, have an inkling about what the sport and its stars mean to the locals and community. The meaning, in short, is blood, sweat, tears, cheers and beers.

Anybody who was lucky enough to watch the performances at this year's NAFOW, saw two fine Welsh actors embody the soul of rugby, and the nation, through two of its greatest stars. Those attending also had the chance to meet and chat with Owen Thomas, the author of these tour-de-force one-actor one-acts. He is also the fine poet playwright who brought the moving play "West" to Rochester, NY's NAFOW and which was presented to the St. David's Society on Zoom and in person in St. Paul.

"Grav" tells the story of one of Wales' rugby icons, Ray Gravell, a fierce competitor who went on to become a much-loved media personality. Gareth John Bale brought him to life for NAFOW's intimate performance, after many national tours of the production.

In "Carwyn," a new production, Simon Nehan gave voice to another hero of the sport, Carwyn James, the unique man and coach whose astonishing mix of culture and passion propelled the British Lions to an astounding upset of the New Zealand Blacks—a victory still carved in the woodwork of the Welsh pubs drunk dry in celebration.

Except for the Olympics, the United States doesn't channel that level of patriotic fervor beyond the local college or state lines. These plays, through their poetry and passion of performance, gave all attending the chills and heart wrenching drama of the personal price of glory for sport and country. The standing ovations, applause, cheers and tears were the sound of an audience treated to a visit with two of the lion hearts of Wales.





Our **fourth NAFOW Member Spotlight** comes from Board Member David Richards who discovered a family connection with Powell, South Dakota when attending a Lincoln NAFOW seminar! In his own words:

Powell, SD was a Welsh community established south of Ipswich, SD on what became South Dakota Highway 45. Residents of Powell included the Richards and Williams families, from which came my parents, as well as all the Hughes, Evans, Griffiths, Roberts and other Welsh families. Over time, natural events (described below) and the routing of the railroad through Ipswich led to the decline of the town. All that remains today is an historical marker on the highway, as well as the small cemetery located just east of Hwy 45.

The historical marker at Powell, where the first group of 300 Welsh immigrants settled on the prairie, reads as follows:

WELSH COLONY AT POWELL

On March 22, 1883, the 300 members of a Welsh Colony arrived by train at Aberdeen, South Dakota. Thirty families led by William E. Powell arrived here on the 29th and built the "Big Shanty" or "Shanty Mawr" on the Hugh Griffith claim on section 9, 1½ miles north where they all lived until moving on their own homesteads and their families arrived from North and South Wales.


The "Big Shanty" was moved here, and the post office with Maurice Jones as postmaster set up July 7, 1883. A general store, J. T. Llewellyn, proprietor; a blacksmith shop, Morgan's "a Go"; Central School, John A. Williams, teacher and a Calvinistic Methodist Church, Rev. John W. Morgan, pastor; a Congregational church, Rev. J. T. Lewis, pastor, were organized and built. All but the general store and the CM church were disbanded because of death, discouragement and hardship and only the hardiest farmers remained.

The Methodist Church was destroyed, the store badly damaged and four farmsteads wiped out by a tornado June 2, 1911.

Determination of the new generation to continue worship in faith resulted in the immediate rebuilding of the church which was dedicated on its present site on Thanksgiving Day, 1911.

On June 8, 1958, to commemorate the faith and loyalty of those hardy Welsh pioneers, the 75th anniversary of the establishment of their trustful faith was celebrated by the congregation of the remaining church, now Presbyterian.

The community was named after William E. Powell who, among other roles, was a railroad official in the area. He was mentioned (and shown, above) during a seminar at NAFOW in Lincoln.

Our **fifth NAFOW Member Spotlight** comes from Don and Janice Barbee who share their Top Five favorite experiences in Lincoln:

First, let us say we didn't attend every offering and event. How could we? There were so many! But we especially enjoyed experiences unique to the Lincoln, Nebraska NAFOW:

- **1. Dick Cavett on Zoom**: We got new insights into our lifelong favorite talk show host, Dick Cavett, a Nebraskan whose grandfather emigrated from Carmarthen. He is still as witty and charming as ever at 86! He told fascinating stories of his career start, famous people he has met, and strange doings during filming his show (including a guest who died on the couch!)
- **2.** "The History of the Welsh Language in Ten Words", based on a popular radio series, illustrated how Welsh is both ancient and a borrower from other languages, in a fun and fascinating presentation.

- **3. Welsh Democracy in 2023 An Insider's View**: Peredur Owen-Griffiths, a member of the Welsh Parliament (Senedd), explained the process of Welsh government how elections work, the mechanics of passing bills, and the relationship—both cooperative and contentious, between the Senedd and Parliament. He personally believes that if Scotland votes for independence, Wales will follow; an outcome that may not result in the short term but seems likely in the future.
- **4. Cinema from Wales**: Of the four movies offered, we were charmed by "*Men Who Sing*," an intimate documentary focused on the life of an aging member of a local men's chorus, and the efforts of the chorus to thrive in changing times. We also saw another movie, "*Efacwis*", a documentary which richly detailed the lives of children evacuated from London to Wales during WWII and interviewed them as adults.
- **5. The Grand Concert** was a smash this year, presented by the popular composer Robat Arwyn, feted by several star classical Welsh singers, and a terrific trio of talented triplets.

Our **sixth and final NAFOW Member Spotlight** is a photo of Society member Catharine Morris, flanked by friends Laurel and Dawn Bradshaw, having just learned that she took a First Place Prize in the English Language Recitation Eisteddfod, delivering Dylan Thomas' "When all my five and country senses see". *LLongyfarchiadau*/Congratulations, Catharine!

MINNESOTA WELSH ASSOCIATION'S FALL GYMANFA GANU 2023 WHAT IS THE MWA'S ANNUAL FALL SING FEST?

Each year in September members of the MWA, friends and guests come together for an afternoon of song, merriment, and camaraderie with old and new friends, celebrating the life, heritage, and culture of Wales. This year was no different, so instead of telling you about the day, I would like to tell you how true the statement above is by sharing a special story of one of our past sing fests.

In 2017 there was a couple, Bryn and Menna Jones from Wales, traveling across the US in search of living relatives, or information about an ancestor that migrated here in the early 1800's. They stopped in Mankato, which they had heard was an area with great Welsh connections. Having nothing planned for Sunday, they read about the MWA Fall Sing Fest in the local paper and decided to attend. During the Sing Fest, we gave Menna her very own national Welsh hymnal. After the Sing Fest Menna and Bryn came down to the *Te Bach* where we started talking and that led to a group of us meeting for dinner. What a fun and wonderful afternoon and evening!

Fast forward to 2023. I was invited by the North America Welsh Choir to go with them on their singing tour of Wales. The first night the choir arrived to sing at St. Mary's Church in Conwy, and who was sitting in front of the church? Bryn and Menna! They had, purely by chance, seen a flyer about the North American Choir being in town to sing and decided to attend the concert to see if they could connect with any of the people they had met in Mankato.

After the concert, 4 or 5 of us who had met in Mankato did connect - there were hugs and hellos but we only had a short time to get re-acquainted as the bus had to get us back to our hotel. Although sad to have to say goodbye so soon, it was so wonderful reconnect.

As we entered our hotel, we noticed a couple waving at us from the lounge. There sat Bryn and Menna, and two of their close friends, waiting for us to arrive. They could not say goodbye so soon either. We talked and sang for most of the night. And it was like no time had passed.

Even if Wikipedia tells us that a *Gymanfa Ganu* is "a Welsh festival of hymns sung with four-part harmony by a congregation, usually under the direction of a "choral director", it is much more. It is a place where friends become family. PRESIDENT'S CORNER PART 2: OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS! THE SAINT DAVID'S SOCIETY OF MINNESOTA WANTS AND NEEDS YOU! By Janice Barbee

When the Minnesota Welsh formed The Cambro-American Society in 1911 (which was renamed The Saint David's Society in 1920), the founders wrote by-laws that restricted board directors to only two consecutive terms of two years each. The intent, I imagine, was to ensure that no one person was in charge for too long and to spread responsibilities around to many members of the Society. This design also gives many members a chance to share their knowledge and creative ideas when planning the Society's events and opportunities.

We will need some new people to step up and join the board in the coming years. For many years now, we have seen many of the same people serving on the Board of Directors. I have been on the board for ten years and president since 2017, a length of service which obviously violates our bylaws. Pam Rose was president for several years and is now our treasurer, allowing Sally Evans to step down after a five-plus year term. Ron Adams has been treasurer of the Society's Foundation for many, many years and has been the Society's investments manager for well over ten years.

As I shared at the Annual Picnic, I will not be continuing as president after my term ends, and we will need a new Society president beginning July 1, 2026. I don't think it is healthy for the Society to have the same president for many years. I hope someone now on the board or someone who will join the board soon will take over as president. We currently do not have a vice-president, and it would be good to have someone take on that role in the years before my term ends. The board might also create co-presidents to spread around the responsibilities.

Please consider becoming a member of the Board of Directors next year. Ryan Ander-Evans will be stepping down from the board after this year, so we will need a new board member by the next Annual Meeting in July.

The main duties of the Office of President are:

- Schedule and lead meetings of the Board of Directors (about 4 times a year, on Zoom)
- Coordinate planning and logistics for annual events: St. David's Day celebration, Annual Meeting and Picnic, Holiday Tea)
- Coordinate planning for other events and activities: Welsh speakers on Zoom, pub gatherings, Welsh movies, guest speakers and performers, etc.

The planning and logistics for the last two items are shared by board members and Society members not on the board.

A healthy St. David's Society is one where many people participate, bringing their talents and skills, and sharing their love of and interest in Wales and all things Welsh. We need to grow as a Society and bring in new members, especially those who, as one of our board members recently said, have brown hair (or blond, red, or black), not gray or white! We have a lot of very talented and knowledgeable members in our Society, and I encourage you to actively share your talents and interests and invite your friends and family members (especially of younger generations) to join. I, and all the members of the board, want to see this Society continue as a strong and vibrant place to honor and celebrate Welsh culture, history, heritage, and arts in Minnesota.
